Parking enforcement is active in Zone 2, meaning proper permits aren't optional—they're essential to avoid tickets and ensure your moving truck has legal parking near your building. Walk-up buildings without elevators are common, particularly in the residential areas south of Armitage, so factor in additional time for stairs. Many vintage buildings have narrow hallways, tight turns, and original architectural features that require careful furniture maneuvering. If you're moving into a larger building with elevator access, coordinate reservation times with building management well in advance, as many properties limit moving activities to specific days and hours to minimize disruption to other residents.

Living in Bucktown

1. ****Schedule utility connections at least one week before move-in****, including ComEd for electricity, Peoples Gas, and internet service. Some providers have limited appointment windows, especially during peak moving season.

Register for your residential parking permit if you own a vehicle—visit the City Clerk's office with proof of residency, vehicle registration, and your driver's license. Update your voter registration, driver's license, and vehicle registration within 30 days of moving to ensure you're properly documented at your new address.
