The route from Chicago to Burns Harbor primarily uses I-94 to I-80/94 (the Indiana Toll Road), with tolls including the Chicago Skyway (\$6.00) and Indiana Toll Road fees (\$4-8 depending on your exit point). Most moves take approximately one hour under normal traffic conditions, but Chicago rush hour can significantly impact timing. Professional movers familiar with the area plan departures to avoid peak congestion periods—typically leaving Chicago either early morning or mid-day. For those moving during summer months, coordinating around tourist traffic to the Indiana Dunes is another consideration. The relatively straightforward highway access means fewer complications than navigating Chicago's urban streets, but winter weather can

occasionally impact I-94 corridor travel.
