Living Here

The suburban layout means most properties have yards, driveways, and garage space—practical advantages when moving furniture and storing belongings. Neighborhoods are walkable and generally quiet, with parks like Community Park and Paschen Park providing recreational space for families. The village maintains a distinct identity while being surrounded by other Northwest suburbs, giving residents access to an even broader range of shopping, dining, and services within a short drive.

Commuting options make Franklin Park particularly practical for professionals working throughout the Chicago area. Drivers have direct access to I-294 (Tri-State Tollway) and I-90 (Kennedy Expressway), putting downtown Chicago within 25-40 minutes depending on traffic. O'Hare is less than 10 minutes away, which proves invaluable for frequent travelers. Metra's North Central Service provides train access to downtown from nearby Franklin Park Station, offering an alternative to expressway driving. The area is served by Mannheim School District 83 and Leyden High School District 212, which many families research carefully when planning moves. Local shopping includes everything from national chains to independent businesses along North Avenue and Mannheim Road, meaning most errands stay within the village or nearby suburbs.
