

Your Complete Guide to Moving in Greektown

Welcome to Greektown

Greektown stands as one of Chicago's most culturally rich neighborhoods, nestled on the Near West Side along Halsted Street. Request these permits at least 10 business days in advance through the City of Chicago 311 system—this isn't optional, as parking tickets can quickly add unexpected costs to your moving day. Living Here

Greektown's housing landscape reflects its evolution from historic immigrant neighborhood to modern urban community. You'll find charming vintage walk-up apartments with original architectural details, mid-century buildings with reasonable rents, and newer construction offering contemporary finishes and amenities. Average rents hover around \$1,900, positioning the neighborhood as moderately priced compared to adjacent areas like the West Loop. The building types here range from classic Chicago three-flats to larger multi-unit complexes, with many featuring the narrow hallways and staircases typical of early 20th-century construction. Street parking operates under Zone 2 residential permit rules, and many newer buildings include garage parking—a valuable amenity in this part of the city.

Daily life in Greektown centers around its exceptional walkability and cultural amenities. Halsted Street serves as the neighborhood's spine, lined with authentic tavernas, bakeries, and specialty shops where you can grab fresh spanakopita or quality olive oil. The Blue and Pink Lines provide direct transit access throughout Chicago, with multiple stops serving the neighborhood for quick commutes downtown or to O'Hare Airport. The nearby UIC campus adds youthful energy and resources, while the expanding Medical District offers employment opportunities within walking distance.
