Parking enforcement is active in Zone 3, so don't skip this step—unpermitted trucks can face tickets that delay your entire moving day. # Living Here

The Metra Rock Island line provides direct access to downtown Chicago and other neighborhoods, making commutes manageable for city workers. 1. **\*\*Request your moving truck parking permit through Chicago 311 at least 10 business days before your move date\*\***—enforcement in Zone 3 is consistent, and proper permits prevent costly delays and tickets on moving day.
1. **\*\*Measure doorways, stairwells, and hallways in advance\*\***, especially in vintage bungalows and older homes where narrower passages can complicate furniture moves. Share these measurements with your moving crew beforehand.
1. **\*\*Schedule utility transfers 2-3 weeks ahead\*\***, including ComEd for electricity, Peoples Gas, and water services through the City of Chicago. Internet and cable providers often need advance notice for installation appointments.
1. **\*\*Plan for driveway and yard protection\*\*** during your move—laying down protective coverings prevents damage to landscaping, concrete, and walkways, especially important in a neighborhood where homeownership and property pride run high.
1. **\*\*Book your moving date early if relocating during summer months or around the first/last days of the month\*\*** when demand peaks and availability tightens considerably throughout the Chicago area.

1. **\*\*Notify the local post office and update your address\*\*** with both Chicago services and any suburban jurisdictions if you're moving between city and suburban areas, as Mount Greenwood sits near the city boundary.
