Parking enforcement is active and consistent here, so proper permits aren't optional—they're essential for avoiding tickets and ensuring your moving truck can park legally near your building. The neighborhood's mix of building types means your specific logistics will vary: vintage walk-ups may involve navigating narrow staircases, while newer buildings might require elevator reservations and coordination with property management.

# Living Here

The Brown Line runs through the heart of the neighborhood, with Metra UP-N service providing another transit option for commuters heading downtown or to the northern suburbs. 1. **Prepare for stairs**: Many Ravenswood buildings are walk-ups without elevators. Take inventory of large furniture pieces beforehand and measure doorways and stairwell clearances to avoid moving-day surprises.
1. **Plan for Zone 2 parking**: If you're bringing a car, familiarize yourself with residential parking permit requirements. Zone 2 permits are necessary for overnight street parking in most areas of Ravenswood.
1. **Schedule utilities in advance**: Contact ComEd, Peoples Gas, and other utility providers 1-2 weeks before your move to ensure services are active when you arrive, particularly important during Chicago's extreme weather seasons.
1. **Consider alley access**: Many Ravenswood buildings have alley access that can

simplify moving logistics. Check if your building allows loading and unloading from the rear, which may be easier than front-street access.
