# Living Here

Residents enjoy multiple routes to Chicago, with the Metra Union Pacific West line providing weekday train service to Ogilvie Transportation Center in downtown Chicago—a commute of approximately 45 minutes. For those driving, I-355 connects to I-290 and I-88, making the suburb accessible to job centers throughout the western and northwestern suburbs. This transportation convenience attracts professionals who work in the city but prefer suburban living, as well as those employed at nearby corporate centers in Schaumburg, Itasca, and the I-90 corridor.

The village serves families through multiple school districts, with most students attending schools in Keeneyville School District 20, Lake Park Community Consolidated School District 108, or Schaumburg CCSD 54 for elementary education, followed by Lake Park High School District 108. Beyond education, daily life in Roselle revolves around neighborhood parks, local shopping centers along Lake Street, and community events that bring residents together throughout the year. The housing stock primarily consists of single-family homes built from the 1960s through 2000s, along with townhome communities and some condominium options near the downtown area. This variety allows families to find suitable housing at more moderate price points than many comparable Northwest Suburbs, making Roselle particularly attractive to first-time homebuyers and growing families seeking space and value.

## Moving Tips for Roselle

1. **\*\*Schedule around HOA requirements\*\***: Many townhome and condominium communities require advance notice for moves, with some restricting moving truck access to specific hours or requiring elevator reservations. Contact your HOA at least two weeks before your moving date.

1. **\*\*Navigate Metra schedules if commuting immediately\*\***: If you're starting a Chicago job right after moving, download the UP-W line schedule and consider parking options at Roselle Metra station, which fills quickly on weekdays.

Once you've arrived in Roselle, prioritize registering vehicles with the Illinois Secretary of State and updating your driver's license within 90 days of establishing residency. Connect with the Village of Roselle offices to understand local services, trash collection schedules (typically managed through Groot or Waste Management depending on your location), and recycling programs.
